FUND UPDATES

The Benjamin S. Gerson Family Endowment

Supports the Gerson Family Resource Center in connecting patients with community resources after trauma or illness interrupts, and sometimes, forever alters their lives.

- Eighteen patients received lymphedema garments, which are critical to managing complications of lymphedema.
- More than 50 patients were assisted with obtaining durable medical equipment, which is crucial to ongoing rehabilitation and independence. This equipment was made possible through the Gerson Endowment and the Gerson Center's partnership with MedWish International to repurpose durable medical goods.
- In partnership with state rehabilitation agency Opportunities for Ohioans with Disabilities, over 30 patients were assisted with career transitions to employment opportunities and financial stability.
- Thanks to strong partnerships with the Western Reserve Area Agency on Aging, Cuyahoga County Division of Senior and Adult Services and the City of Cleveland Department of Aging, patients have been provided with access to supportive services addressing issues that have long-term impacts on their quality of life.
- Because support groups are vital to helping patients adjust to changes caused by traumatic events, the Gerson Center provides referrals to the MetroHealth Trauma Recovery Center, the Brain Injury Association of Ohio and MetroHealth's Stroke Support Group.

In collaboration with the Physical Medicine & Rehabilitation (PM&R) Department, a Peer Mentoring Program and related support groups are being developed with The Amputee Coalition.

Gerson Resource Center Gap Endowment – Last year, the Gerson Gap Fund provided patients in need with more than \$21,000 in resources like financial assistance, medical and accessibility equipment and wraparound services, including rental and utility assistance, auto insurance and bus passes.

Spinal Cord Endowment and The Jeanette Grasselli Brown and Glenn R. Brown Endowment – Funding from these endowments allowed various team members to attend national conferences to obtain training to improve specialized care for those with spinal cord injury (SCI).

The P. Hunter Peckham, PhD and George J. Picha, MD, PhD Endowment – Funding helped to set up an advanced testing station for implanted technology and conduct long-term testing in preparation for human implantation. Once troubleshooting and testing was completed – for which securing federal funding is difficult – staff began implanting devices in patients with SCI. Those with paralysis in both arms and legs had function restored in their hands and arms, allowing them to feed themselves and perform other daily activities. As a result, three patients with SCI have been successfully implanted during the past year, which is more than has been achieved since 2006.



DEPARTMENT UPDATES

Research is an essential part of advancing patient care, and grants are vital to ensuring that innovative research continues. In 2023, the collective contributions of the MRI's talented researchers resulted in a variety of accomplishments:

47 invited presentations
114 abstracts

49 peer-reviewed articles were published with 12 in production

9 books or book chapters were published with 6 in production

\$92.3 million in grant funding

Nearly 45 clinical and research faculty members


7 residents (6 rehabilitation, 1 physical therapy) and 6 fellows graduated

SUCCESS STORY: Patient's Trauma Leads to Meaningful Work

A man slipped on the ice-covered parking lot of a senior care facility where he worked as an administrator, hit his head, and immediately experienced chronic headaches, dizziness and other symptoms. After MetroHealth's Outpatient Brain Injury Program diagnosed him with a visual convergence issue, he received several therapies and enrolled in the Work Matters program, as it was clear that he couldn't continue working as an administrator. The man began part-time work that capitalized on his skills and current abilities and is now pursuing a master's degree in social work.
